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
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MISSION STATEMENT

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Geneva Teachers Receive Tech Upgrades

A teacher opens her laptop, turns on a projector, and shows a slide of a famous painting to her students. She asks, "What do you see in this painting?" And then, "Do you know who painted it?" Finally, "What was going on during this time period?" Thus she introduces her lesson to her students. Gone are the days of, "Open your books to page 121." Technology has made access to important works possible at Geneva.

Thanks to a grant provided by the George W. Jenkins Fund within the GiveWell Community Foundation, Geneva purchased 15 laptops for our teachers along with four new overhead computer projectors. These machines were purchased and set up by our IT specialist, James Hammett of NetMan, Inc. Teachers

were trained on how to utilize them optimally by Dr. Jennifer King, formerly the director of technology instruction at Florida Southern University and now with her own consulting firm. She spent an entire day demonstrating the possibilities and training teachers how to use technology to get students into Higher Order Thinking. She called us "H.O.T." teachers!

Now our classrooms have dynamic PowerPoint presentations by teachers, involving great works of art as well as images of historical sites, artifacts, music, films, and enormous amounts of information. In addition, students are able to utilize this technology for their own projects and presentations. Thanks to this generous contribution, a new day of technology has dawned on Geneva.

National English Honor Society Issues Chapter to Geneva



As an outgrowth of Geneva's individual course offerings to Dialectic and Rhetoric students, the new Geneva Homeschool Partnership Program provides families of grammar-aged students the opportunity to homeschool while benefiting from the support and resources of an established program. Geneva's mission has always been to partner with parents in the stewardship and responsibility of "training up a child in the way he should go." This program aligns beautifully with that mission while also offering flexibility and a more "hands on" approach to a child's education.

Participating students have the opportunity to attend special classes such as music, art, and physical education on the days they are on campus, and follow a structured lesson plan on the days they homeschool. This program follows the same scope and sequence of the full-time curriculum, and meets the high academic standards of Geneva. The Homeschool Partnership Program is a great fit for families who desire assistance and direction with lesson planning and content while seeking a homeschooling experience.

Kelly Nix, our first grade home school partnership teacher, is the product of a homeschool education and has a passion for the "art" of home education. Her love for learning carried her through several departments during her undergraduate and graduate work, including music, English, and religion, before she finally landed in the education field. She holds a Master of Arts in School Administration from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in North Carolina and taught various subjects in multiple schools while working through her own schooling. A large portion of her graduate studies was devoted to the concept of a school/parent partnership model for education, as well as the writing of curriculum and materials that would assist parents and teachers in this endeavor. If you've been on campus, especially after school, no doubt you've noticed many athletes heading to various practices, drills, and matches. In the fall, Geneva added girls' varsity volleyball to our growing roster of varsity football, cheerleading, men's basketball, JV volleyball, and archery. A winter addition was a men's IV basketball team.

The Geneva Knights football team kicked off the season with a new head coach, Paul Brown, who trained his young men to play hard every week, coaching with a team-oriented philosophy. The Knights moved from their old home field, "The Pit," and brought the Friday night lights to Geneva's campus. Anyone driving on Lakeland Highlands Road during a game would have seen the bright lights and heard the roar of the crowd as we cheered on the Knights football team in front of the school. The team ended their season on a high note with a 58-32 victory against Peniel Baptist. Of course, the Knights football team would not have performed nearly as well if it were not for the Geneva cheerleaders supporting them. Once again, Lory Pyle coached the Knights cheerleaders. This year she had

three returning cheerleaders and added five new girls to the squad. Though the squad was young, they did an excellent job of leading the crowd and keeping the football team's spirits high.

Andrea Wiegman coached both the JV and varsity women's volleyball teams. She loved coaching the girls, and both of the teams preformed very well, ending the season with successful records of 7-4 for JV and 8-2 for the varsity women. Geneva hosted the Central Florida Athletic Conference tournament in November. Despite girls missing due to injury and travels, the Knights varsity team managed to dig deep, overcome adversity, and finish in second place. Congratulations, Andrea and the volleyball teams!

New Faculty Additions Continue to Raise the Bar at Geneva

We at Geneva are unabashed in boasting about the master teachers the Lord has brought to our campus. For the 2014-15 academic year, He blessed Geneva again with the addition of six outstanding faculty members, three full-time and three part-time.

Donna Lynam joins Geneva's faculty as our fifth-grade teacher. Donna holds a BA in Biblical Education and a Masters of Education Administration. Geneva welcomes **Lisa Brock** as our K5 teacher. From 2005-2010, she taught sixth grade at Geneva, and we are excited to have her return to our faculty. Her husband, Peter, is the Associate Pastor of Missions at Faith Baptist Church in Winter Haven, where he has served for 11 years. Prior to that, they served together as missionaries to the beautiful people of Italy for 10 years in the industrial city of Torino, Italy. Peter and Lisa have four children: two sons and two daughters. The older three are married, and Megan, who is 18, is looking forward to completing her senior year at Geneva.

Lisa adds, "I am thoroughly enjoying being the kindergarten teacher at Geneva! She then went into teaching reading and math remediation which gave her experience with all the elementary grade levels, kindergarten through sixth. While living in the mountains of Colorado, she taught second grade at a classical Christian school, and there she fell in love with the classical model.

Shelly adds, "My children love knowing that Mom is right upstairs, and I enjoy stealing hugs and kisses as I see them throughout the day. I have also loved the personal relationships and friendships I have developed with their teachers, which are strengthened all the more since we work together. I have seen a particularly positive influence for my son, Gavin. He is a different child since coming to Geneva. He attended a public school for kindergarten and first grade, and though he learned, he was very unhappy. Over the past couple of months I have seen the joy of learning return to him.

"Knowing my children are in a loving and nurturing environment centered on Christ, knowing they are receiving an amazing classical Christian education, and also the fact that I get to teach an incredible group of third graders... I feel beyond blessed! Geneva has certainly been an answer to prayer, and I am honored to be here."

The National Junior Classical League, founded in 1936, is now the largest academic organization for middle and high school students in the world, with a membership of over 50,000. NJCL is sponsored through the America Classical League, for the express purpose of encouraging students to study and appreciate the classical languages, literature, and culture of ancient Greece and Rome, and how "the classics" have so profoundly influenced our own culture.


Many people may think of FJCL as an enlarged "Latin Club," but the scope of classical studies reaches deeply into the philosophical, religious, ethical, and aesthetic foundations of our country. When we make an effort to understand and appreciate "the classics," we reap the benefits of interpreting and appraising ourselves.

The National Junior Classical League is comprised of 1,200 local and state/provincial chapters across the U.S., Canada, and Australia. Our local chapter is under the "umbrella" of the Florida Junior Classical League, which is under the auspices of the NJCL.

As an affiliate of the NJCL/FJCL, our Geneva chapter, now in our second year, offers our 6th-through 12th-grade students opportunities to participate in academic, creative, graphic arts, and athletics at the state and national conventions; a creative-writing contest; local, state, and national quiz-bowl competitions, called "Certamen;" National Latin (or Greek) Honor Society; and scholarship possibilities for both students and teachers on the state and national levels. NJCL/FJCL also offers student leadership opportunities on the local, state, and national levels. However, students may consider the greatest benefits of membership to be the possibilities for fun and friendship with other students of common interests.

Our 2014-2015 Geneva chapter currently has 12 card-carrying members. We meet on Thursdays after school and will be meeting almost every Thursday now through February for Certamen practice and preparation for the FJCL Orlando regional forum, to be held in late January or early February.

Faculty Interview:

Michael Strawbridge Brings Passion to New Position

Beloved teacher and mentor Michael Strawbridge joined Geneva's administration team this year with the added title of Head of Upper School and the duties that accompany it. We asked Mr. Strawbridge to share a bit about himself with our readers.

EV: How long have you been a Lakelander, and what do you love most about the city?

I was born in Lakeland and, outside a short stint of but three months during which I left the country and then moved to San Francisco, I've lived in this fair city all my life.

What do I love most? Family. My family has been in Lakeland for almost 60 years. In addition to my grandmother, mother, and siblings, I'm surrounded by a growing plethora of cousins, aunts, uncles, nieces, and nephews — and I'm happy about it! We don't plan on going anywhere. Lakeland is home.

EV: What is your educational background?

I homeschooled and studied at Cambridge Study Center all the way through high school. I went on to earn a bachelor's degree in classics from the University of South Florida and a master's in Latin from the University of Florida.

EV: How long have you been teaching?

My first official teaching job was that of teaching Latin and logic at Cambridge Study Center in 2007-2008. In 2008-2009 I began teaching at Geneva.

EV: What do you consider your greatest accomplishment?

Easy: my employment of ethos, pathos, and logos — central elements of rhetoric — as I persuaded Joy-Marie Harrison to marry me.

EV: How has the Lord prepared you for teaching at Geneva?

My parents always exemplified a love of learning. This has, no doubt, done more than anything else to prepare me for teaching. Their desire to understand the world, their love of great books and science and history and philosophy and the big questions of life, their passion for theology and God's Word, inspired me as a young man — and continues to do so — to love and pursue the same. I was also introduced to Latin in high school through the Cambridge Study Center. This introduced me to the wonder of classical languages.

EV: What are your greatest strengths which you bring to your students?

I hope that my training, preparation, experience, love of learning, and passion for what I teach are amongst my greatest strengths.

EV: How have you adjusted to leading Geneva as Head of Upper School?

With a lot of help from my friends. I watched Doug Smith closely as he led last year, and, prior to taking the position, I sought guidance and counsel from him and Mr. Cali. I continue to do so as I adjust to my new role.

EV: How do you apply the ideals that you disciple in the students and faculty to your own life?

I seek to grow in my knowledge and understanding of God, his Word, and his world — thereby growing in wisdom. I want the pursuit of understanding to be something that is bigger than formal education and the classroom: I want it to be an integral part of my Christian walk. If our students and faculty are applying their Christian faith to all of life — in fact, seeing no other way to live — then God has accomplished something great through us.
