### GENEVA'S ACCREDITATION: THE THIRD TIME AROUND

his is an important year for Geneva in that we are seeking accreditation renewal from the Association of Classical Christian Schools (ACCS) for our third time. The first time we received the initial two year "temporary" accreditation, and the second time we received our five-year accreditation. It is time to pursue it again.

When choosing a school, parents sometimes ask a simple and important question of the institution they are considering: "Are you accredited?" Accreditation is a way of communicating to inquirers that the school is accomplishing what it claims, and it is accountable to someone outside the organization. While authority to educate children comes from parents, not accrediting agencies, accreditation demonstrates a school has done the hard work of meeting the accrediting agencies' standards. This can give some reassurance to parents for their choice of schools.

Many parents have been informed enough to ask this initial question, and it would behoove them to learn to follow up with, "By whom?" Geneva recognizes that the assumptions of the accrediting agencies matter: What does the agency believe about children? What do they believe about truth and reality? What do they believe about God? Consequently, Geneva has chosen ACCS from which to seek our official recognition because their requirements are meant to observe how effectively the school truly educates classically and Christianly by nourishing students' souls with Biblical truth and passing on our classical legacy. Our vision and mission align most closely with this agency.

Our Accreditation Coordinator, Linda Morrison, a former Geneva teacher, staff member, and long-time supporter of the school, has managed this project. First in 2015, for the renewal in 20217-18, and again this year. She gathered information, accumulated documentation, and wrote reports to complete the self-study, which, with the help of the Faculty and Staff, she submitted this year for our renewal.

Reflecting on the process, Linda Morrison said, "When Mr. Cali and I first discussed the accreditation project, we agreed it would be a sometimespainful, but ultimately, a profitable endeavor for GCA. Profit is accrued from the tedious, systematic process of self-study, a process which revealed areas where we can improve our practices. Moreover, profit lies in external validation for what we already knew: GCA provides a high-quality education facilitated by an outstanding staff and faculty. I was privileged to partner with the board, staff, faculty, and families in a significant feat for GCA."

Geneva hosted the ACCS Regional Summit, a conference for classical Christian school headmasters, principals, and administrators in the southeast, and by all accounts, it was a huge success. One of the participants sent a message afterwards saying, "Thank you so much for hosting [us] at the ACCS summit last week. You have a great school, and we are grateful for your leadership in our region! Your whole team was lovely and did a nice job with all the details." ACCS confirmed that this event showcased Geneva's role in the association as a resource for other schools in the region. This put us in good standing before the visitation team's arrival. The observation was completed in early March through a rigorous process of meeting our teachers, students, and board members, evaluating the results of the self-study.

We are exceedingly grateful to our staff, faculty, and board members for the sedulity that propelled us through the reaccreditation process. The Association of Classical Christian Schools has concluded that Geneva's vision, mission, and methodology of instruction align with their standards. Geneva Classical Academy has once more been granted reaccreditation.



## Amber Alderman

Grammar Music, Upper Vocal Arts

mber Alderman, though not a native of Lakeland, has lived, attended church, or worked in Lakeland for most of her life. She thinks Lakeland is small enough to provide a hometown feel and the ability to build community connections, but large enough to support a thriving fine arts community. 
Eliana Alday Christmas in the Congo

The performance is the culmination of the students' attentive practice throughout the first semester. Thank you to those who supported our Fine Arts Department this year!



























